LEARNING FROM OUR PETS

There are many tricks we can teach our pets to do. Training them to sit and stay on command can help keep them safe, while other tricks are just for fun, like giving paw or jumping through a hoop. But did you know that pets can teach us too? Below are some of the things we can learn from loving and caring for these wonderful companions.



Patience – Some pets move slow or need time to adjust in a new environment. It's important to remember to remain calm and relaxed while giving them the time and space they need.

Resilience – Being able to keep going when a situation is difficult or challenging. Take a look at the 'Pet Spotlight'. Sir Batman is a great example how a pet can be resilient and work through a difficult time.





Responsibility – Pets rely on caretakers to provide them will all the things they need to be happy and healthy. These items include fresh food and water, shelter, time with their families and by themselves, and veterinary care.

Unconditional Love – Providing an animal or those who care about them, love without conditions or expectations. This means being able to love them no matter what.





Respect – It is important to be mindful of what pets do and don't like. We always want to respect their needs by treating them with kindness and consideration. A quick way to show a pet respect is by interacting with them in ways that will make them comfortable. You can do this by walking toward them slowly, using a soft voice and gentle hands when petting them.

PET SPOTLIGHT

Sir Batman came to CT Humane Society because his family could no longer care for him. The medical team provided Sir Batman with an exam where they learned he had a few injuries. One of those injuries was on his tail, which was caused due to stress. The veterinarians and behavior team worked together to help Sir Batman feel better by building up his



confidence and preventing further stress. His treatment included surgery to relieve his pain and lots of enrichment to keep his brain and body moving.

Spring and Summer are known as tick season. Ticks are most frequently found on our pets (and even us) during this time of year.

Ticks are small bugs who are found outside. They can't jump or fly so they stay low to the ground, hanging out on leaves and grass. Taking our pets through grassy areas can increase their risk for getting a tick on them and the potential for getting bit. Tick bites can be harmful to us and our pets because they can make us sick, but there are ways we can help our pets stay safe from ticks:

- Walk on a clear path keeping away from long grass and shrubs.
- Check your pet's skin and fur for any ticks after time outside, especially after walking through or playing in grassy areas.
- Dogs and cats can be given a preventative medicine. This will help in case they get bit.
- Tell an adult if you see a tick on yourself or your pet. They can help remove it using tweezers.
